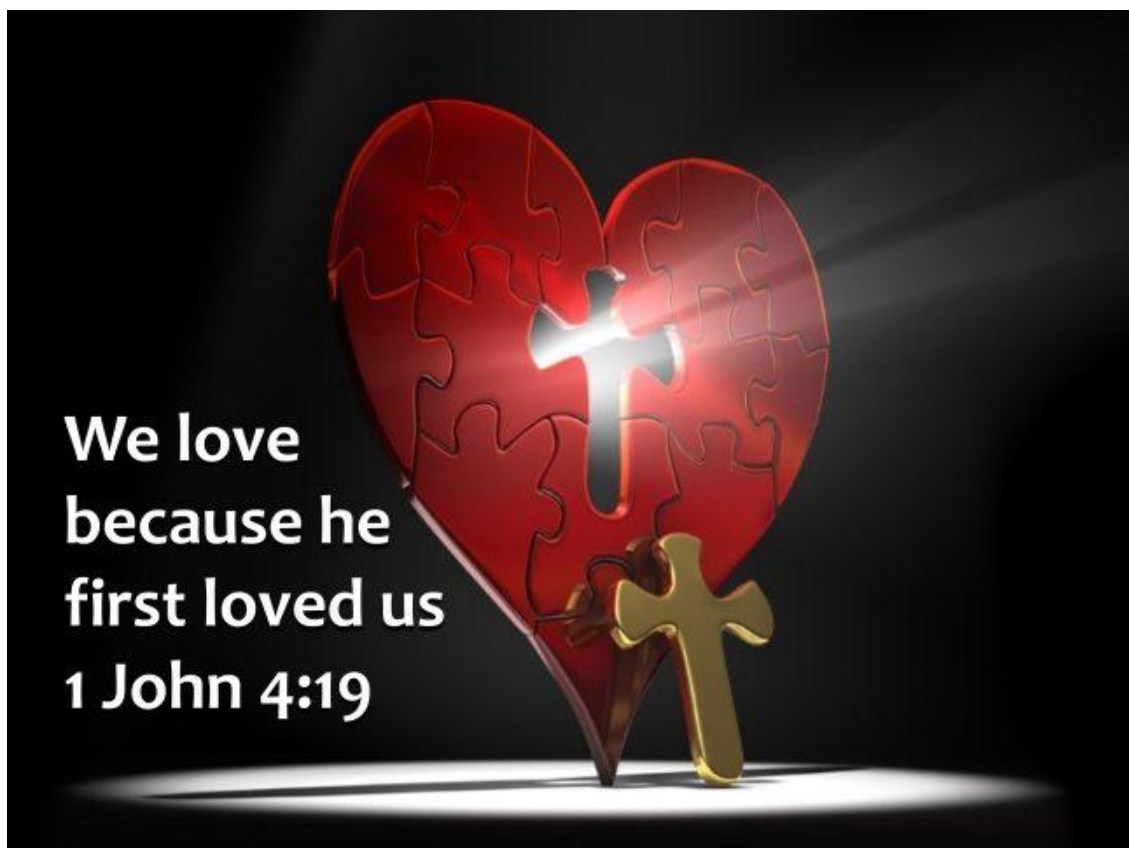

**Be Grateful, Be Creative and Be Kind - Aileen Christie, Outreach Worker:
St Serf's, Lochgelly & Benarty**

This Lent, St Serf's, Lochgelly and Benarty are on a Journey to Easter led by a rather excitable squirrel! Everyone is encouraged to Be Grateful, Be Creative and Be Kind with a weekly video Bible story told with the help of puppets.

Messy Church had transferred successfully to Zoom but was dependent on doorstep delivery of materials. When that had to stop, we sent all our families 6 themed sheets introducing a Bible story and giving suggested activities for the week – eg. making pancakes, building with Lego, sending a card to neighbours.

The week is kicked off with a short puppet clip on Facebook linked to our Community Group page where everyone can share pictures of what they're up to. All videos and links are also on YouTube. Our minister is preaching online each week on the same passage, so everyone is included.

For the first time (ie. first time ever not just since lockdown), we have seen genuine interaction between Messy Church families at one end of the parish and older members at the other. The paper sheets mean those not digitally connected can take part and even if people don't interact, they know we care and are thinking about them.

Society, Religion and Technology Consultation

You may be aware that at the General Assembly of 2019 the Faith Impact Forum were asked to consider the future of the Society, Religion and Technology (SRT) Project. The SRT was set up by the Church of Scotland 51 years ago to examine the ethical and social implications of new technology. Through its reports, it advises the Church on policy regarding some of the biggest issues facing us today.

The Faith Impact Forum has formed a working group chaired by a member of the forum, Rebecca Gebauer in order to do this review.

We have created a survey that aims to collect as broad a range of views on the work of the project which will be used to shape and further develop the work of the Church in this area. It is especially important to the working group to capture the views of church members who have had no or very little engagement with the SRT.

Participation in this survey is entirely voluntary and anonymous unless you wish to be further engaged in the review process. Filling the survey will usually take around 10-15 minutes.

I would be grateful if you could take the time to fill in this survey and also forward it to all the conveners and youth workers within your presbytery, it will be available until **Friday 19 March**.

SU Ireland and SU Scotland have teamed up yet again to produce this free 3 part video series that provides a fresh perspective on Easter and why it matters for us today.

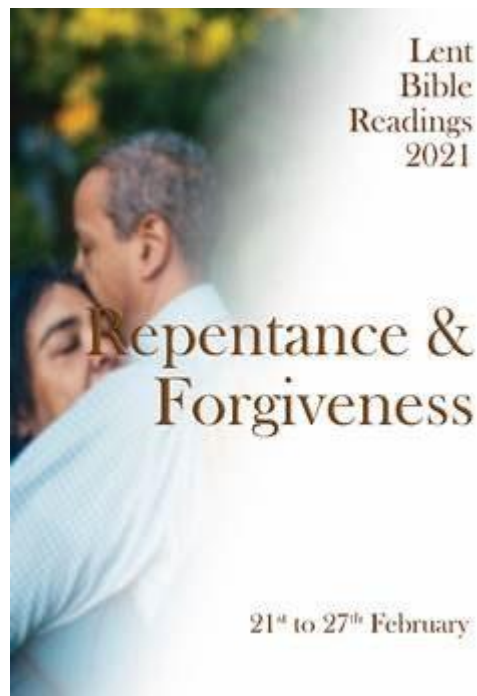
Available from March 9th...

Lent reflections online

An imaginative multimedia resource for the season of Lent has been produced by two Church of Scotland ministers, Robin Hill and Alec Shuttleworth. Their Lent Daily Journey involves a series of seven weekly magazine guides to Bible readings which are intended to take participants on a spiritual adventure, leading all the way to Easter Day.

In each virtual issue a range of activities will be offered for different stages of the day. First, there will be a Bible passage to read on screen each morning. If preferred, the click of a mouse will allow that reading to be heard from one of four readers.

For the middle of the day there is a prayer, followed by an afternoon musical reflection. Then to close each day there will be a short evening video meditation from Alec.

Among the readers is professional actor M.L. Stone, best known for playing Maggie LeBeau in BBC Scotland's Police comedy series, *Scot Squad*, and the Scottish opera singer Frances McCafferty

A team of seven musicians will offer very different styles of hymn renditions, ranging from church organ to concert grand piano, from cello to mandolin, from blues guitar to flute quartet to vocals.

This project is very much a family affair as Alec has enlisted brother Andy as a musician and son Jack as a reader. Meanwhile, Robin has roped in his orchestral-musician sister Ann to play her flutes.

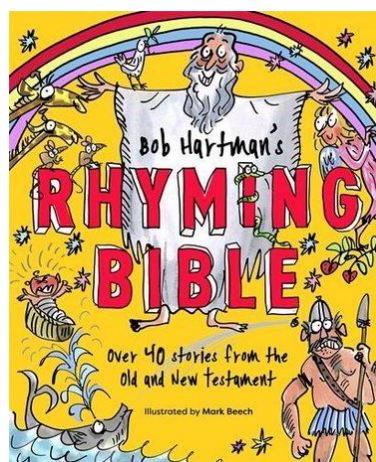

DramaKirk: Easter 2021

For Easter, Drama Kirk is producing an engaging way to share the Easter story with Primary School-aged children, a series of five poems from Bob Hartman's "Rhyming Bible". Together, they tell the Easter story in an accessible way. We will perform the following:-

Waiting in Line – This poem introduces Jesus and lets us hear about various things he has done – and how wants to see children!

The Clip Clop Beat – On Palm Sunday, Jesus enters Jerusalem on a donkey. Let's hear about what happened in a fun rap.

Body and Blood – The last meal Jesus shared with his friends. Find out what happens and what he tells them will happen next.

When Jesus Hung Upon the Cross – We look at what Jesus said on the cross and what happened that first Good Friday.

No More Crying – It's not the end of the story! Jesus' friends are sad...but not for long. Something amazing is about to happen!

The Community & Third Sector Recovery Programme

The Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations (SCVO)'s Community & Third Sector Recovery programme aims to support charities (including churches, community groups, social enterprises and voluntary organisations) that are supporting people and communities through the shift from lockdown to recovery. As well as providing ongoing crisis support, they will be planning and implementing changes to adapt and thrive in a very different social and economic climate.

The programme is currently open and has two strands: Adapt & Thrive and Community Recovery Fund.

In the simplest terms, Adapt & Thrive is capacity building to help organisations adapt, change, and thrive post-COVID-19. The Communities Recovery Fund is grant funding to deliver support and services in communities.

Money for Adapt & Thrive has to be allocated by the end of March but can be used for up to 12 months thereafter. No match funding required and grants range from between £5K and £75K.

Volant Trust: Funding to Alleviate Social Deprivation

The Volant Charitable Trust's Grants programme has re-opened for applications. The fund aims to support Scottish charities and projects that help alleviate social deprivation. Specific themes the fund will consider for support include:

Women - Victims of sexual abuse, rape, domestic violence and those working in the sex industry; care for young mothers and those affected by postnatal depression, isolated and lone parents; community support for black and minority ethnic women and asylum seekers; support services for women prisoners and their families.

Children and young people - Counselling, support services and outreach projects for those who are disadvantaged or deemed to be at risk through neglect, emotional and physical abuse, alcohol or drug misuse.

Poverty and deprivation - Mental health projects for women and children; support for vulnerable families; promotion of healthy eating for families in areas of extreme deprivation. Registered charities, community interest companies, community organisations and social enterprises can apply for grants of up to £15,000 per year for up to three years.

Funding is administered by Foundation Scotland and can be used for project and core costs. Applicants are initially required to complete an enquiry form outlining their project. This must be submitted by the 30th April 2021.

Funding to Create Resilient Rural Communities

Grants of up to £10,000 are available for projects from across the UK which are working to create resilient rural communities. The Prince's Countryside Fund will award funding from the Barclays 100x100 UK Covid-19 Community Relief Fund to support farming and rural communities to cope with the impact of Covid-19, to expand on new services that have emerged to support the local community during this time and to build future resilience. Applications are encouraged from community-led organisations with a turnover under £500,000 per year, from communities with a population of up to 3,000 residents. Examples could include rolling out longer term food and medicine delivery services; social groups to support isolated people; or mental health support. The Fund will close when enough eligible applications have been received.

Funding for Community Based Projects

The Hilden Charitable Fund awards grants of an average of £5,000 to causes working at community level in the UK and developing countries which are less likely to be able to raise funds from other sources. Current UK funding priorities are: • Homelessness, • Penal Affairs, • Asylum Seekers and Refugees, • Community-Based initiatives for Disadvantaged Young People Aged 16 to 25. Overseas, Hilden concentrates on projects in developing countries working on community development, education, and health and particularly welcomes those that address the needs and potential of girls and women. Only applications submitted on the form supplied on the website will be considered. Hilden accepts applications at any time but the closing date for applications to be considered at the next meeting of Trustees is the 16th April 2021.

Grants to Help Older People Lead More Fulfilling Lives

Barchester's Charitable Foundation is a grant giving charity that helps older people and other adults with a disability across England, Scotland & Wales to lead more fulfilled lives and reach their full potential. The Foundation's focus is on connecting or re-connecting people with others in their local community, helping combat isolation and loneliness and enabling people to be active and engaged. Funding of between £100 and £5,000 is available for individuals and small community groups to help improve people's mobility, independence and quality of life. Individual applications must be completed by a third-party sponsor such as a health care professional, social worker or charity/support group representative. Applications are assessed on a case-by-case basis, with funds allocated to those who demonstrate greatest need.

People's Postcode Trust Opens for Applications

The People's Postcode Trust has re-opened its grants programme and will award grants on a monthly basis until October 2021. Funded by players of the People's Postcode Lottery, the Trust makes grants to support smaller charities and good causes in Scotland under the following themes: • Improving mental wellbeing • Enabling community participation in the arts • Preventing or reducing the impact of poverty • Supporting marginalised groups and promoting equality • Improving biodiversity & green spaces • Enabling participation in physical activity • Responding to the climate emergency & promoting sustainability • Increasing community access to outdoor space Registered charities can apply for grants of up to £20,000, other not for profit organisations can apply for grants of up to £2,000 to support both project and organisation core costs. The funding is available for 12 months. To be eligible to apply, organisations will need to have an annual income of below £1 million with preference given to those with an income of below £500,000 per year. The Postcode Community Trust will operate on a monthly basis. On around the 1st of each month, applications will open, and organisations will be able to submit their request for funding until the maximum number of 150 has been received until the 1st October 2021.

AllChurches Trust

AllChurches Trust like to fund projects that demonstrate an impact on people and communities. Applicants should include clear (and where possible, measurable) outcomes for projects and demonstrate how they will ensure sustainability beyond our funding. It's also important to show how additional funding support will be sought to enable the project to be completed.

Our open grants normally fund capital projects and equipment, not salaries or running costs, with the exception of our transformational and Hope Beyond programmes. In most cases, we give a small percentage of the project cost as this enables us to say yes to more worthwhile causes, although we do occasionally give larger grants.

National Church Trust

Funding available for Scotland's cash strapped churches and chapels

A range of grants are available from the National Churches Trust

Churches and chapels in Scotland needing funding for urgent repairs and maintenance are being encouraged to apply for grants from the National Churches Trust.

In 2021, the church support charity expects to allocate more than £1.5m to churches and chapels throughout the UK. Any church, chapel or meeting house in Scotland that is open for regular public worship can apply.
